

## **CONSERVATION TARGETS**

1. Concerning the wildlife conservation targets, it is focusing primarily on indigenous antelope through a captive breeding program. Eventually, with sufficient infrastructure and expertise, the project should be able to accommodate rhinos, particularly orphaned baby rhinos who require immediate and attentive care if their parents have been poached.

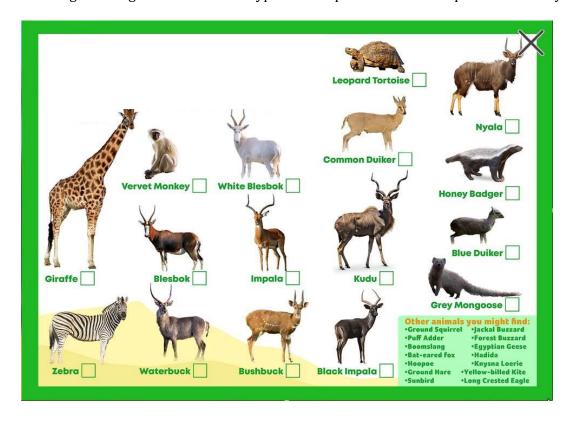

2. The target for the outreach program with Mama Africa begins with the total number of poachers in the area, estimated to be in the regions of 25-30 poachers. The target is an annual reduction of 30% of the total poachers active in the conservation area. It is the aim of the Wildpark to eliminate poaching in the area after three years by persuading them to adopt the Mama Africa business platform as an alternative source of income.

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To maintain a poaching free zone the Wildpark will engage with the community through regular educational and training initiatives to keep potential new poachers informed of alternative ways to earn a living.

3. It is the intention of the Unipanel Company to be in a position to supply all the necessary funding for the maintenance and growth of the Wildpark conservancy by 2025. New ideas for products and service will constantly be researched during this time to expand the potential for external financing and thereby also expand the vision and scope of Wildpark Africa.
